Why the Cambridge Leaders Network?

One of the most significant needs of the worldwide evangelical church is the development of its next generation of leaders. As emerging leaders step into influential roles, they are faced with a host of challenge such as:

- How to maintain an intimate relationship with the Lord when responsibilities are growing
- How to biblically love and lead others to spiritual maturity
- How to develop leadership skills, i.e. plan strategically, communicate a vision, manage time, determine objectives, recruit and develop staff, and manage finances and resources
- How to critically evaluate popular leadership thinking from a biblical worldview

Across much of the world, there is a glaring scarcity of resources and information for these gifted leaders. As a result, they struggle to develop their capabilities and serve God's people effectively. If emerging leaders are to grow to spiritual maturity in Christ and fully use their gifts, they must have access to the mentoring and leadership development resources that will help them completely realize their potential. The Cambridge Leaders Network attempts just this.

What is the Cambridge Leaders Network?

The Cambridge Leaders Network (CLN) is a weeklong program held each July in Cambridge, England. It is designed to help key, emerging leaders think about leadership from a biblical perspective. The CLN curriculum is based on an explicitly biblical worldview and takes advantage of the best in leadership thinking while focusing on developing individual skills.

The program consists of the following elements:

- 1. Text-Based Discussions** centered on pre-assigned reading selections
- 2. Targeted Lectures and Discussions** with experienced Christian leaders
- 3. Case Studies** written and submitted by participants will provide the opportunity to apply biblical thinking and leadership wisdom to real life problems and will be discussed in small groups
- 4. One-on-One Mentoring** between each participant and a senior leader who will suggest possible approaches to tough issues and offer encouragement for specific struggles
- 5. Strategy or Project Assessment** for a written description of a strategy or project with which each CLN participant is currently engaged. This strategy or project will be discussed with a senior leader who will provide instructive evaluation.



Who is on the Cambridge Leaders Network Faculty?



John Lenton, CLN Director is a former Honorary Pro-Rector of Emanuel University of Oradea, Romania an evangelical Christian university accredited by the Romanian Ministry of Education. In 1998,

John was instrumental in helping to launch the Griffiths School of Business at Emanuel University. Prior to moving to Romania in 1998, John was a Senior Vice President at American Express Europe, where he occupied a number of senior positions over a period of 15 years with the company, taking early retirement at the end of 1996 in order to devote himself to full-time Christian service. John has an M.A. from Oxford, an M.B.A. from Harvard, and is also an ordained minister in the Church of England, having studied full time at Oak Hill Theological College shortly before moving to Romania.



David Jones is the former CEO of Stewardship, the trusted brand and intermediary for Christian giving and broader resourcing. Connecting over 30,000 givers and 17,000 charitable recipients, Stewardship is building a gener-

ous resourcing community to effect transformational change. David is a strategic leader and relational connector. As well as serving Stewardship as CEO for the past 10 years, David has been closely involved in a dynamic and entrepreneurial church/social charity that operates locally (in East London), nationally, and internationally. David currently works as a leadership and strategy consultant.



Dirk Jongkind is a Dutch biblical scholar who finished his Ph.D. at Cambridge University. His main scholarly interest is in the Greek text of the Bible and the Graeco-Roman backdrop of Acts and the letters. Currently, he is the Research

Fellow in New Testament at Tyndale House. He is working on legal language in and outside the New Testament. The focus of his work includes textual criticism of the Greek Bible, with emphases on grammar and lexicography, epigraphy, papyrology, and archaeology of the Graeco-Roman world and the relation of New Testament background and exegesis.



Peter Loose was trained by BBC as an Engineer and worked at Marconi Research for ten years. He set up his own Technology Research company in 1973 as well as a special purpose computer company and eventually took both of these

businesses public on the stock exchange. He has established businesses related to the primary U.K. research company in the

U.S., Japan, and Holland. Peter is now retired and, with his wife, has devoted his life to Christian ministry, including work with off-the-street teenagers.



Jeremy Peckham is a Fellow of The Royal Society of Arts and 1st class honours graduate in Applied Science. He began his career as a government scientist at the UK Royal Aircraft Establishment and later moved to Logica, an

international software and systems integration company. He founded a speech recognition company in 1993 and launched a successful public offering on the London Stock exchange in 1996. Jeremy is now a technology entrepreneur and has helped establish several high tech companies over the last ten years for which he has served as interim CEO, chairman, and non-executive director. Jeremy served as an elder for many years at Eden Baptist Church, Cambridge, UK and is currently a member of Wood Green Evangelical Church, Worcester.



Mark Stirling is a former medical doctor who has worked in student ministry with the Navigators in Edinburgh. In 2007 he completed an M.A. in Exegetical Theology at Covenant Seminary in St. Louis. He, his wife Jenny, and their four children now live in St. Andrews, Scotland where they seek to help

students grow to maturity in Christ. Mark is currently engaged in Ph.D. studies in Theology and Biblical Studies (Learning Christ in Ephesians) at the University of St. Andrews and is involved in helping to lead the work of the Navigators amongst students in the U.K.



Peter (P.J.) Williams is the Warden (CEO) of Tyndale House. He received his M.A., M.Phil., and Ph.D. in the study of ancient languages related to the Bible from Cambridge University.

After his Ph.D., he was on staff in the Faculty of Divinity, Cambridge University (1997-1998) and thereafter taught Hebrew and Old Testament there as Affiliated Lecturer in Hebrew and Aramaic and as Research Fellow in Old Testament at Tyndale House, Cambridge (1998-2003). From 2003 to 2007 he was on the faculty of the University of Aberdeen, Scotland, where he became a Senior Lecturer in New Testament and Deputy Head of the School of Divinity, History and Philosophy. In July 2007 he became the youngest Warden in the history of Tyndale House. He also retains his position as an honorary Senior Lecturer in Biblical Studies at the University of Aberdeen and is a member of the Faculty of Divinity in the University of Cambridge.

When and where is the Cambridge Leaders Network?

The 2011 CLN will be held from Friday, July 8 - Thursday, July 14. It will begin with a weekend retreat, and the remainder of the time will be spent at Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge University.
